## The Role of the Environmental Clerk of Works – project management through common sense and understanding.

In recent years it has become a common place for there to be a requirement for an Environmental Clerk of Works (ECoW) to be appointed as a condition of a planning consent and / or environmental permits.

The Environmental Clerk of Works is typically a suitably qualified and experienced environmental professional, who is responsible for overseeing all environmental matters on site, and discussing these matters with the contractor, developer, and local authorities. RML as an environmental consultancy provides a full ECoW service to their clients.

My purpose in writing this newsletter is to outline the roles and responsibilities of the ECoW when visiting development sites that are under construction, as sometimes there is a lack of understanding of the role.

### What does an ECoW do?

The main role of the ECoW is to oversee ecological and environmental issues and ensures compliance with legislation, planning conditions and other documentation relevant to the project. The ECoW role requires a broad working knowledge of construction sites and their potential environmental issues, and is ideally supported by a multidisciplinary team to function correctly. Within RML the ECoW team works alongside the Environmental/Project Manager and other specialists to ensure that the Client is fully compliant with relevant legislation, planning conditions and project specific documentation.

The RML team has extensive experience in providing environmental management and monitoring of construction works ranging from highways to wind farms. Post construction management is also an important element in most contracts.



The ECoW role itself requires regular on-site presence, the frequency of which is determined on a site and construction requirements basis. The key aspects of the role are the communication with the client, site personnel and all other stakeholders as well as the production of written reports.

The ECoW works closely with the Client, Site Manager and the RML team to ensure that legislation is adhered to, project specific protection measures are implemented and site specific environmental/ecological mitigation measures are fulfilled. It is important to point out that only under the instruction from the client does the ECoW have the authority to halt construction works on a development should there be an unacceptable environmental risk.

It is a common misconception that the ECoW's role is to "Police" construction activities; I see me being there to advise the client of their environmental obligations.

In my next email I will discuss elements of the legal framework and responsibilities of an ECoW.
